Dear Dean Stenport,

The faculty of the Hugh Hodgson School of Music have voted to consolidate the five Bachelor of Music Degrees (Performance, Education, Therapy, Composition, Theory) into a single Bachelor of Music Degree with corresponding areas of emphasis. This will allow the HHSOM to continue to offer instruction in each of these areas regardless of graduation rates from any one of these areas, and will also position the school of music to more nimbly add areas of emphasis in the coming years to continue to meet the demands of the changing professional career opportunities in music. At this time, we are not proposing any changes to the existing curricular requirments within each area of emphasis. New areas of emphasis currently under consideration that appear to be within reach with current faculty resources include Jazz and Contemporary Music Studies, Music Technology and Production, and Musical Theater.

#### **JUSTIFICATION:**

The faculty of the Hugh Hodgson School of Music approved a vote to consolidate five separate majors under the Bachelor of Music degree (Music Composition, Music Education, Music Performance, Music Theory, and Music Therapy) into a single major with five areas of emphasis. Consolidation of these programs will allow students more flexibility in changing concentrations and specializations without increasing time to completion.

As many courses are shared between programs, this streamlined approach will allow the School to better utilize existing resources. The School of Music is accredited by the National Association of Schools of Music, the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education, and the American Music Therapy Association, and currently offers the only residential Music Therapy program in Georgia. Eliminating redundancies in the current program structure will provide an opportunity for faculty to offer new areas of study to meet the changing professional landscape and demands of the music profession while maintaining a high quality of instruction.

#### 1. Area of Emphasis Description:

The program of study for the Area of Emphasis in Music Composition under the major in Music (B.Mus.) provides three years of applied study on a major instrument (years one through three), as well as three years of intensive study in composition (years two through four). Students will be required to participate in seminars which focus on analysis and evaluation of student compositions. The program includes a strong foundation in theory and music literature along with applied study on a secondary instrument. Performance of contemporary music is emphasized. The four years of study culminate with a composition recital which presents a multi-movement or large-form composition for an ensemble of three or more instruments. Students in the Area of Emphasis in Music Composition majors are also required to present recitals in their applied area, either vocal or instrumental.
