Program Abstract:

The online Post-Baccalaureate Certificate in Classical Languages was designed to be a one-year certificate for students who have already earned an undergraduate degree and are interested in furthering their education in Greek and Latin languages and literatures. The program was also designed to be of interest to secondary school teachers wishing to enhance their backgrounds or acquire continuing education credits. The certificate served as a stepping stone for students who need or desire additional courses prior to acceptance into a graduate program or teaching in secondary schools. In contrast with other programs across the country, the UGA program is taught completely online which makes it a one-of-a-kind program in the U.S.

Enrollment in this program has historically been low and the program has been without a director for several years.

2. What will be done to minimize the impact of the deactivation or termination of the program upon the personal and professional lives of the faculty and staff involved? The program is currently inactive and deactivation will not impact students, faculty, or staff.

The program is currently inactive and deactivation should not impact other programs within the Classics department.

No students are currently enrolled in the certificate.

5. What plans, if any, are there for subsequent reactivation of the deactivated program?

The department is currently exploring the creation of an online M.A. program to replace the post-baccalaureate certificate, while keeping options open to see which direction works best with the department's Summer Institute.
